# Northbridge's War Memorial Clock has a new look

At the bottom of Strathallen Avenue, in the shadow of the Suspension Bridge, is Northbridge's striking sandstone War Memorial Clock. The Memorial is located in a small Council reserve, in a prominent, highly visible position and viewed by tens of thousands of motorists, cyclists and pedestrians who pass it every day.

NPA is now seeking contributions from individuals and entities within the Northbridge community to complete the restoration of this icon in time for the celebrations of the Gallipoli landings in 2015.

### Funded by the women of Northbridge

Before World War II ended, the Northbridge community had decided to build a Memorial to the fallen and, among many alternatives, a clock tower was agreed. Money for the Memorial Clock was raised by the Northbridge Women's Comforts Fund. The Secretary, Mrs J G Lamb, was reported in *The Sydney Morning Herald* as saying she believed this was the first war memorial to be erected by a women's organisation in Sydney.

The Memorial was unveiled on May 8, 1948 by then Governor, Lt-Gen John Northcott, with local Boy Scouts forming a guard of honour. About 1,000 people attended the ceremony, among them Mr W M Hughes MP and Dame Mary Hughes. Ethel Powers, the president of the Northbridge Women's Comforts Fund, cut the tape at the opening ceremony. "This was followed by a grand parade up Strathallen Avenue," says Edna Senior, who attended the unveiling and who is still a resident of Northbridge. "It was really a gala event and there was much excitement in the community."

### Years of neglect

Unfortunately, after 65 years of neglect, the Memorial Clock was in a poor state of repair and needed urgent attention. The clock mechanism was no longer reliable, corroded internal fittings needed replacement, and the blackened exterior of the sandstone monument needed to be repaired and cleaned. The




Left – The clock before its restoration and (right) after its recent spruce up (clock hands are on their way).

work was complicated by the discovery of asbestos in the mortar between the sandstone blocks.

### The restoration project

Northbridge Progress Association (NPA) suggested the restoration of the Memorial Clock as a 2013 Northbridge Centenary project. The total cost of the monument's restoration, landscaping and floodlighting was estimated by Council to be approximately \$120,000.

In July 2014, Council completed the cleaning and asbestos removal and ordered the new clock components at a cost thus far of \$74,000 of which \$10,000, including a \$4,000 grant from the Department of Veterans' Affairs, was contributed by NPA. Once the new hands are delivered and installed, it will be a fitting reminder of those in the community who contributed to the nation's wartime efforts.

# Council matters

### Northbridge Plaza car park

Much public consultation has taken place in the last few months with regards to this ongoing community issue.

No conclusion has yet been reached, but Council will collate all the input received and come back to the community for further consultation.

### Parking strategy

Willoughby Council's On-street Parking Strategy planners are looking at ways to ensure suitable parking is available for public, residents and workers in the Willoughby municipality. In Northbridge, it is looking at introducing resident parking permits and restricted parking in streets around the Plaza, Northbridge Oval and Shore Oval as a means of alleviating local problems; as well as policing more rigidly, the 2 hour parking limit at the Plaza. Council is still seeking feedback before the final policy is determined.

Many surrounding residents and users of Tunks Park are concerned with boat trailers being parked along Lower Cliff Avenue for extended periods of time. On weekends, when many of the fields are used for sport, parking spaces are in short supply and the narrow road space has been the cause of many near misses. After recommendations by the Traffic Committee, Council has instigated, on

a 12 month trial basis, a 12 hour parking limit for the lower section of the road and a 72 hour limit for the upper section.

### 54-56 Strathallen Avenue

Council has received a development application for these two properties together. 54 Strathallen has been the subject of two DAs over the past two years, one of which was approved in February. NPA had previously written to Council requesting any DA be deferred until both 54 & 56 could be developed together. This new application incorporates both properties, and the proposal is for a 4-storey mixed-use development comprising commercial premises on the ground level, ten residential units on the upper three levels and ten parking spaces.

### **Anytime Fitness**

Council is currently assessing an application by Anytime Fitness to permanently continue the 24 hour operation of the gym following the conclusion of the 12 month trial. Once the assessment is concluded the results will be taken to a full Council meeting for a decision, possibly in September.

# Baths improvements update

Driving down the newly cleared Widgiewa Road into the Baths car park, you'll see positive signs that Council is starting to deliver on the 35 point plan developed in March. New bitumen extensions and stormwater channels, repaired railings, a small litter bin at the head of the stairs, and repaired steps complement the bushcare weeding and litter-free surrounds. New traffic signs warn unwary drivers of the sharp steep left turn to the boatshed. Further structural works will improve safety for pedestrians and vehicles on this corner.

The old timber signs and corroded fencing have been removed. The new galvanised railing and tree lopping opens the splendid vista to Sailors Bay. Beneath our feet, the stormwater pipe has been cleared and new concrete plates installed. In the grassed area, spring will see some top dressing and levelling of the raised rear area as well as garden improvements. On the concrete forecourt and eastern walkways, removal of trip hazards and smoothing of rough areas is underway.

Ladders are being improved, and the stormwater pipe end-tray will be straightened to ensure all piped water falls outside the floating boom. Oyster shells will be removed from high risk areas like stairways and ladders by December. The vigorous growth of the oysters shows how healthy Sailors Bay water has become over the last decade!

Inside the changing rooms, a thorough "spring clean" is planned. An unexpected requirement by RMS for a DA for the new floating pontoons is being energetically addressed by Council managers, who are striving to have the pontoons installed in time for Swimming Club's October 18 Opening Day.

Our thanks to Northbridge Progress Association and Northbridge Swimming Club for helping invigorate this project to assure Northbridge Baths' future as a low cost, low key, family friendly recreational facility.

The safety and functionality of the existing street furniture will be assessed during this process, with improvements made where required. Council will use this opportunity to upgrade adjoining footpaths within the vicinity of the new shelters where needed. Shelters will feature tactile paving to ensure the site is safe and accessible and in compliance with Australian Standards. Many of the shelters also contain advertising panels, which generate additional revenue for Council. All materials from the existing shelters will be recycled where possible. Once installed, the new shelters will be cleaned with recycled water.

### Well done, NPA!

Isn't it great to see the sandstone War Memorial Clock in Strathallen Ave restored to its original golden glow!

We should all congratulate Northbridge Progress Association on its efforts over the past two years in persuading Council to restore the impressive memorial, which was funded by Northbridge women in 1948. In particular, NPA President Rob Coote and past President Peter McNair have worked hard with Council officers to plan and fund work on the memorial. We should also commend NPA for contributing \$6,000 of its own funds and \$4,000 from a Federal DVA Grant towards Council's costs on the work so far.

To its credit, Council has hired contractors to clean the blackened sandstone, remove asbestos from the tower and floodlight the memorial. The old and unreliable clock mechanism has been removed.

But more work and funds are required. The clock mechanism needs replacement and the surrounding reserve has been neglected. As much as possible should be done before the Gallipoli anniversary in 2015.

Let's all support NPA and Council in completing this long-overdue project in our beautiful suburb.

### Closure of the Commonwealth Bank

It is a very sad thing that the Commonwealth Bank has closed its face to face banking in Northbridge. The fact that they now expect everyone to make deposits and withdrawals by machines recently placed in Northbridge Plaza ignores many of their clients' ability to do so, as well as ignoring the need for many other banking services that are no longer available.

Becoming au fait with the use of the new machines, my bookkeeper who is very tech savvy, found the whole process very time consuming. Depositing cheques and cash has resulted in inaccurate transactions by the machines which means that each



transaction, if not correct, has to be cancelled and re-done. On two occasions the bank staff member who was there had to shut down the machines to retrieve cash that had been counted incorrectly. What happens if an inaccurate deposit is not discovered until later? It must be difficult for those in our community who are not able to comprehend this new way of banking and I despair at how hard it is for those who have mobility and sight issues.

Particularly from a business point of view, making a deposit with a teller took say 5 minutes, now the same deposit takes up to 20 minutes. This is all done in plain view of people in the Plaza. You are standing there with your cash deposit for all to see and the same would apply for cash withdrawals. No security at all! I believe the bank is duty bound to offer personal service for those of us who do not wish to be swallowed up in the impersonal world of mechanical devices, be reduced to PINs and unable to speak to a person for help.




# Rotary and architects support youth refuge

The Rotary Club of Northbridge has joined with SPUN, a North Shore network of architects, to donate \$7,500 to Taldumande Youth Services, a community-based, not-for-profit charity based in Neutral Bay. The funds will be used to pave and relandscape the gardens at the facility, including replacement of an existing inadequate pergola. The gardens are used by Taldumande for its clients to rest and relax as well as for functions held at the refuge.

Rotarian Noel Phelan said the club expects that Alex Christiakoff, one of SPUN's architects, will help with the design of the new work and that Willoughby Men's Shed and Northbridge Rotary club members would help to carry it out. "With a hands-on approach, we should be able to maximise the use of the funds available," Noel said.

Taldumande CEO Katrina Richardson said that the donation was very welcome. "The garden is an integral part of life at the refuge, year round. The current pergola is old and needs repair and we also need bench tops, seating and privacy screening for the area." Taldumande Youth Services' aim is to help prevent youth homelessness. The charity provides support and accommodation for homeless youths. The refuge is the only one of its kind on the North Shore and it is manned around the clock. "The success rate in terms of young people returning to the family home is over 80%," Katrina said.

# Vale - Elsie Kaye, Angel of Northbridge

Elsie Kaye's personal philosophy was JOY - Jesus, Others, Yourself - and in living by that philosophy she earned the title The Angel of Northbridge due to the work she did for others in Australia and around the world.

Elsie died on June 1, aged 95, and a memorial service was held on June 15 to celebrate her life and work. About 200 people packed St Mark's Church to hear relatives and friends speak affectionately about Elsie's life and her wonderful work for others. Her grand-niece, Jane Chivers and grand-nephew, Luke Hastings, painted a wonderful picture of the best aunt who entertained and spoilt her nieces and nephews and turned every visit into an adventure. Susan Peake, a neighbour, spoke of Elsie's work, which began as The Morning Group and was just a get together of local women who brought along their sewing projects to enjoy a chat and a cup of tea at Elsie's. This simple beginning developed into Elsie's enormous project which Susan described as "The greatest recycling venture ever seen in Northbridge".

Elsie's family came to Northbridge in 1930 when she was 10 and she lived in the family home in Namoi Road until she moved into a nursing home in about 2010. While working in the Australian Taxation Office, she cared first for her invalid mother and afterwards for her ageing father. When her father's eyesight began to fail, Elsie made soft toys for him to stuff, there-by giving him an interest. That was the start of Elsie's toy collection which turned into a very large endeavour. Before long, people were bringing toys, clothing, household items and even furniture for Elsie and her helpers to sort, repair and send off to various organisations and charity groups locally and far afield, including Africa, Fiji and Russia. She was much loved by the Aboriginal community of Redfern and she would visit them, travelling by public transport, to help out where she could.

Elsie was very appreciative of the people who assisted her. "My helpers are like the sands of the beach - all are treasures in their own way", Elsie was quoted saying in an article in the North Shore Times in 1995. "Whether gathering, making or delivering, they are all my beautiful willing slaves."

### Always involved in the community

Christmas was a busy time for Elsie and her helpers. The repaired toys would be set out for different groups to choose what they needed. She also distributed food hampers with enough goodies to make up a nice Christmas dinner for people who otherwise wouldn't have had one. Her house was quite a wonderland and each room was packed with different items – one room for the boys' toys and clothes, one for the girls'. Shortly before Christmas, the kindergarten children from St Mark's would troop to Elsie's house, each with a gift to donate. They would run through the house playing with every toy they could find and then were treated to cake and ice-cream in Elsie's back garden. This was an event enjoyed as much by Elsie as by the children.

Elsie was also President of CLAN, the Centre for Leisure and Activity in Northbridge, which organised classes, outings and exhibitions for almost ten years from 1983. She gathered as many people as possible into her home on Saturday evenings to enjoy a home-cooked roast dinner. If someone could not come on the night, she would deliver the meal. Elsie was named Citizen of the Year by Willoughby Council in 1986 and in 1991 the Rotary Club of Northbridge awarded her Rotary International's highest honour, a Paul Harris Fellowship. She was a finalist in the 1995 Sydney Electricity Community Spirit Award, and when the Northbridge Progress Association awarded her a Life Membership, it presented her with a wooden plaque engraved by Arthur Reed, a member of the Friendship & Craft Club, and on it was her motto – JOY.

The Combined Churches Committee of Northbridge is discussing the possibility of continuing part of Elsie's activities so her wonderful work will not be forgotten.
